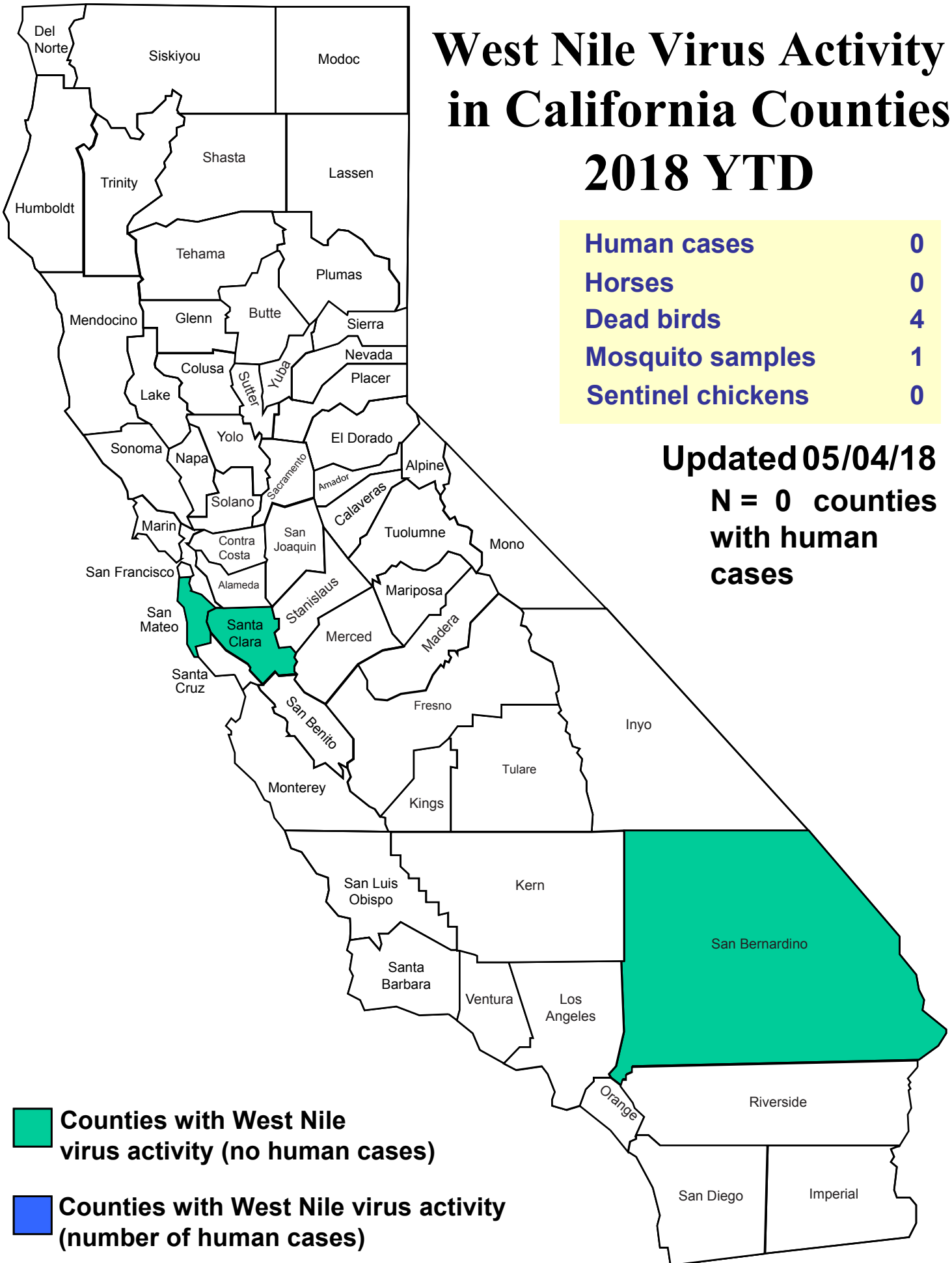

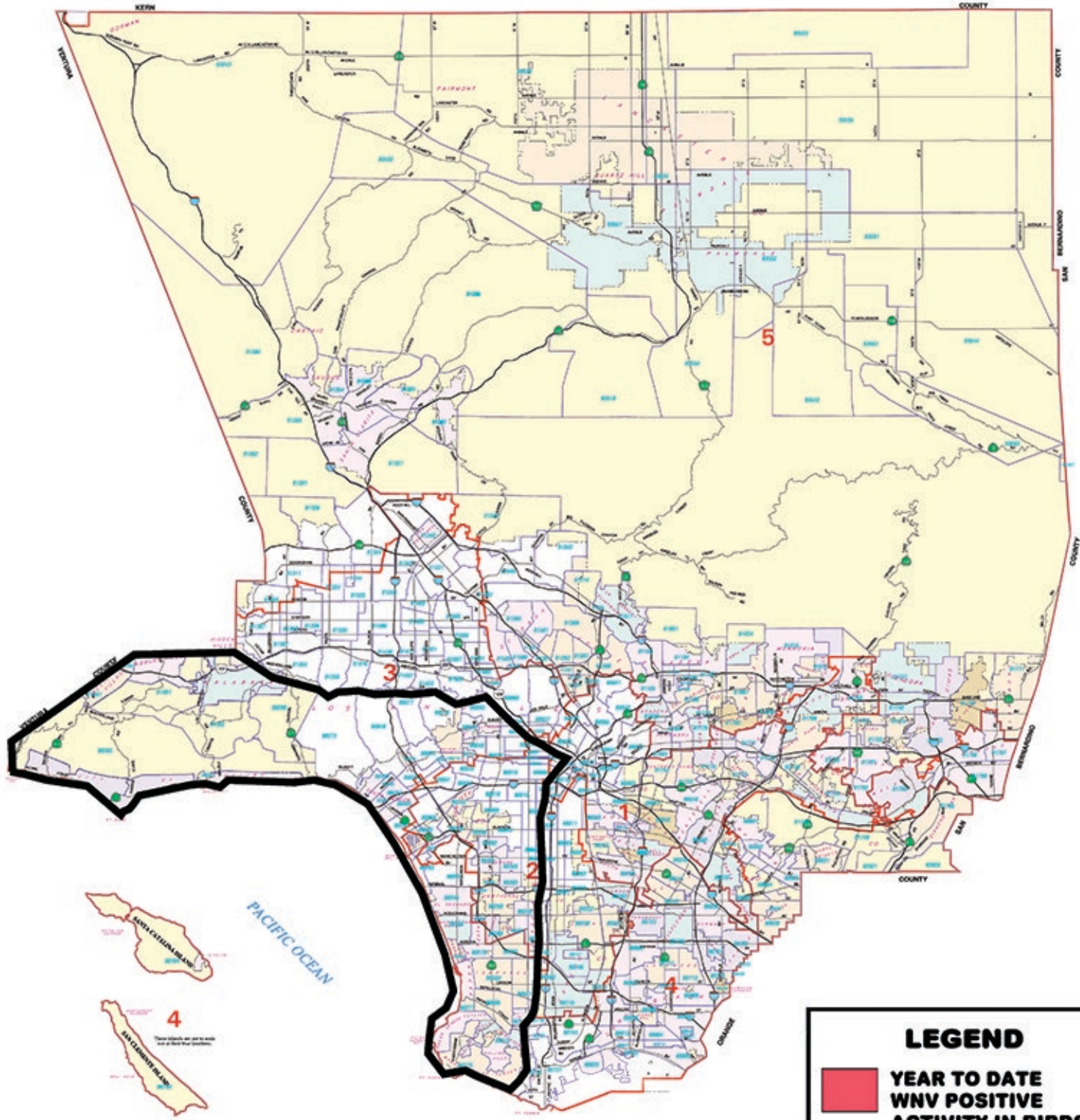
West Nile Virus Activity in California Counties 2018 YTD

West Nile Virus and Other Arboviral Diseases: 2017 Los Angeles County Epidemiology Final Report January 26, 2018



West Nile Virus (WNV): In 2017, Los Angeles County (LAC) Department of Public Health (DPH) documented 266 WNV cases including 27 fatalities. LAC accounted for slightly more than half of the state burden and 13% of the national burden of clinical cases in 2017 ([California](#) = 509, [USA](#) = 2,002). This year's 27 deaths is the highest count of fatalities documented since WNV emerged in LAC in 2003. Previously, the highest count was in 2015 when there were 24 deaths. This year also contributed the 3rd highest number of cases documented and longest recorded season with the last onset date occurring December 24, 2017. Most cases occurred in residents of the Pomona, Glendale, Hollywood-Wilshire, and Central health districts.

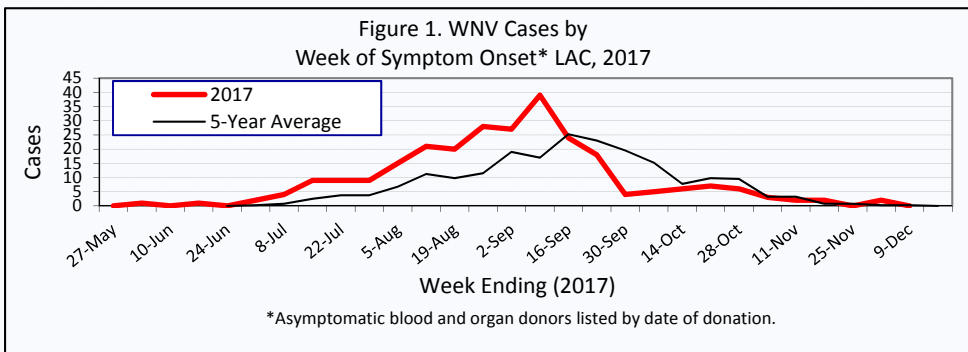

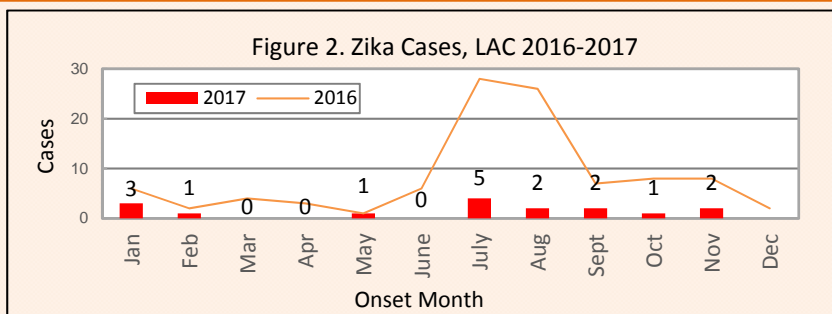

Zika: Since 2015, LAC DPH has identified 123 total cases of Zika virus infection. Only 17 were reported in 2017 compared to 101 in 2016 (Figure 2). One case was acquired through sexual transmission in which the partner traveled to Mexico. All other cases in 2017 acquired their infection while traveling outside the US (Table 3). Since 2015, 28 pregnant women with Zika infection have been identified in LAC, all of whom acquired their infection during travel to Mexico or Latin America.



Zika is Still a Risk

Although the number of cases has substantially declined, Zika is still affecting Mexico, Central America, and other areas. All symptomatic persons with possible Zika exposure through travel or sex should be tested. [CDPH released new testing guidance for pregnant women and infants on January 10, 2018 and no longer recommends routine testing of asymptomatic pregnant women with recent Zika exposure.](#) There is currently no local transmission in LAC, but the mosquito that spreads Zika is found in many parts of LAC. These mosquitoes are not yet infected with Zika and we want to keep it that way! Travelers returning from Zika risk areas should be encouraged to wear insect repellent and take other mosquito bite precautions for 3 weeks after returning to prevent infecting local mosquitoes.

Zika Virus Update

ZIKA UPDATE:

Situation Status:

- There have been no locally acquired mosquito-borne cases of Zika reported in Los Angeles County or California.
- In the United States, [14](#) cases, all travel-related, have been reported in 2018. In 2017, [432](#) cases of Zika were reported: 419 in returning travelers; five cases through presumed local mosquito-borne transmission in Florida (n=2) and Texas (n=3); seven cases via sexual transmission; and one case via laboratory transmission.
- Of the [5,676](#) total cases reported in the continental U.S. since 2015, [645](#) of the cases were in California, and [138](#) of those were in Los Angeles County. Only Florida and Texas experienced **locally acquired** outbreaks since 2015, with Florida reporting [300](#) and Texas reporting [11](#).

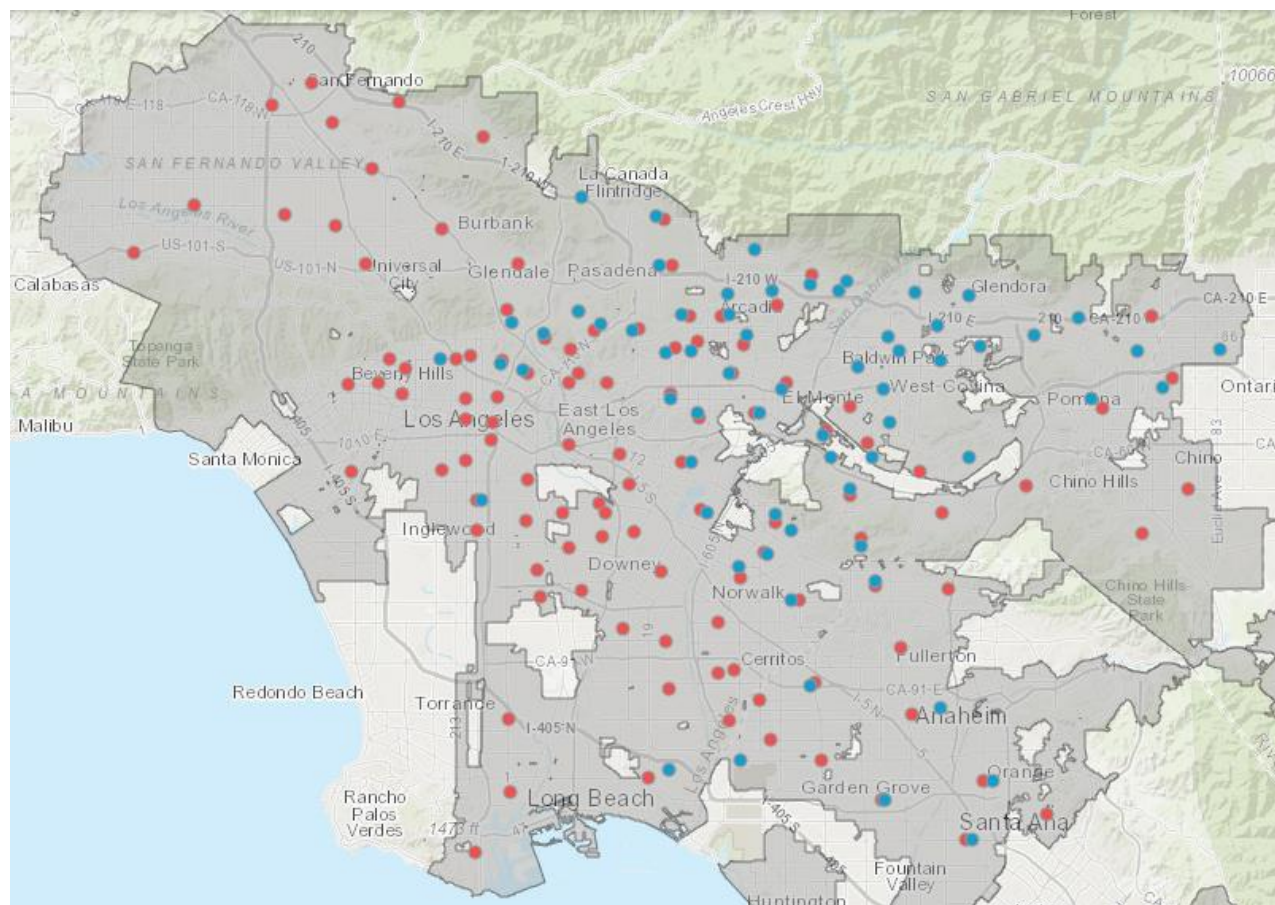

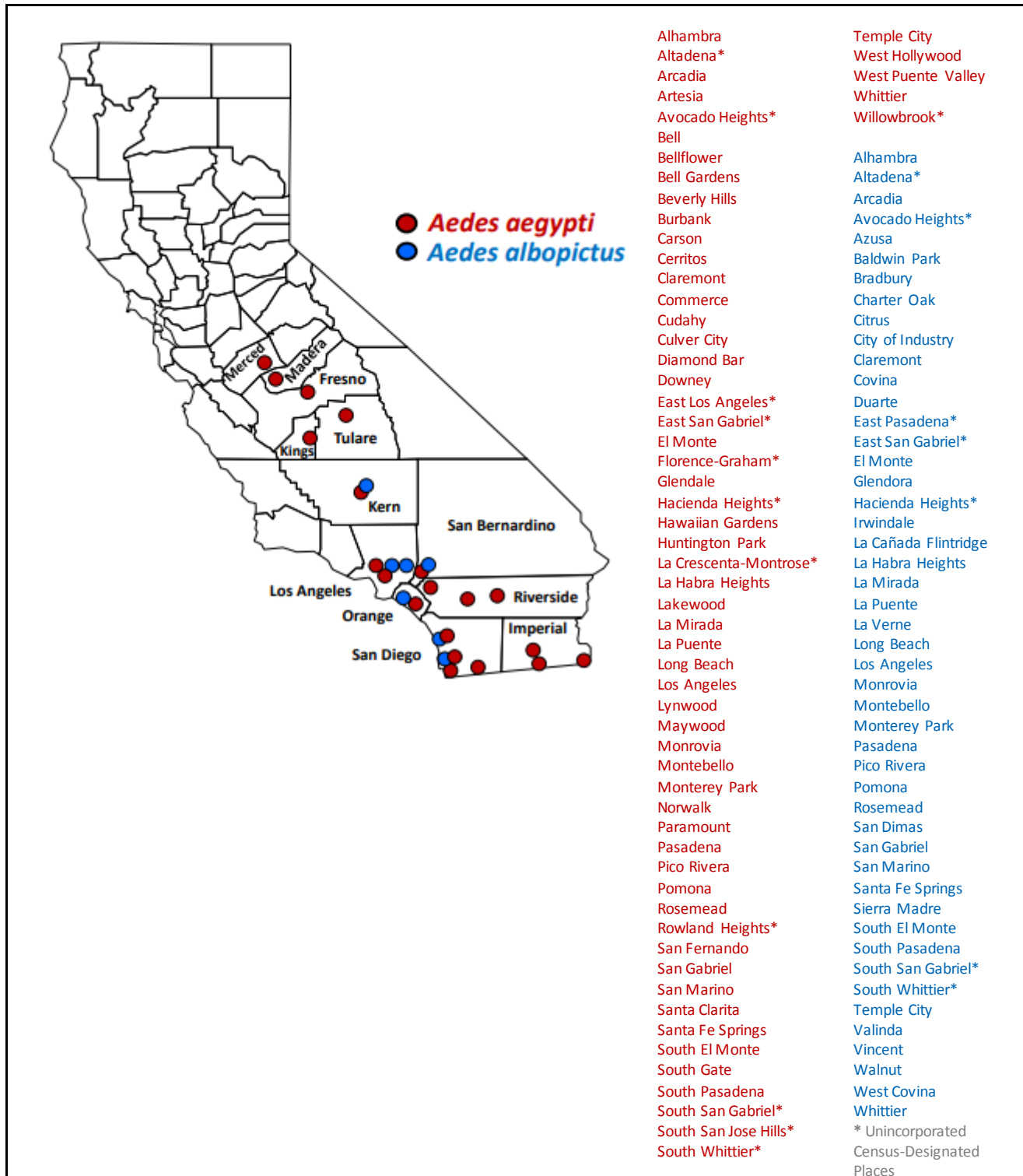
- There were **5 new infections reported this month (4-6-18)** in California. There has been a total of 645 confirmed cases of Zika in California to date, including: 174 in pregnant women (160 completed pregnancies); nine due to sexual transmission; and 11 live-born infants with birth defects. Aedes aegypti and *Aedes albopictus* Mosquitoes in California

- The map below shows the **twelve California counties** as well as **Los Angeles County cities** that have been identified with mosquitoes that can carry the virus (Merced County the latest addition), but none have shown mosquito-borne transmission ([CDPH, 4-6-18](#)). Formerly included on the map, Alameda County had *Ae. aegypti* in 2015 from a release of the mosquitoes, but has not detected the species since. San Mateo was also de-listed due to no detections in 2017.

Public Education

PUBLIC EDUCATION PROGRAM

BACKGROUND

An essential program of the District includes educating the public about the life cycle of honeybees, mosquitoes, ticks, vector-borne diseases, property owners' responsibilities, and functions of the District. General public education is accomplished through the means of informational brochures, fact sheets, city bulletins, public speaking engagements, public service announcements, informational booths at community events, and the District web site (www.lawestvector.org).

Media and service group packets and videos describing the services of the District, backyard mosquito breeding, Africanized honeybee preparedness, Lyme disease awareness and other vector-borne diseases have been widely distributed in addition to thousands of informational pamphlets. Public service announcement tapes are routinely distributed to local cable stations and written public service announcements are distributed to local radio stations.

District staff has implemented an education program in the public and private elementary schools through a cooperative effort with the teachers. The programs offered cover aspects of honey bee, tick and mosquito biology with an emphasis toward public health and safety. The District provides each class with student and teacher workbooks, brochures, bookmarks, videos, and visual aids. District staff trains the teachers and encourages them to include the program as part of their yearly science curriculum.

The District staff has indoctrinated the residents of the District to coexist with the Africanized honeybees by utilizing the various elements of the Public Education Program. The District has been the lead agency in training and coordinating fire departments, police departments, and 911 systems throughout the District in preparation for Africanized honeybee emergencies.

Hyperion:

Hyperion maintains to have multiple offline batteries during this period, all are being monitored closely and are either drained or treated with pesticides until they are repaired and fully restored.

During this period an added Primary Battery #2B were put on offline status.

District staff attends meeting with Hyperion management team on every other Tuesday of the month to exchange information and review inspection reports.

Due to a rise in the mosquito counts in a few of the traps in the neighborhood above Hyperion a survey was conducted and staff found four (4) separate breeding sites within the neighborhood and at a construction site vault in Hyperion. All sites were abated.

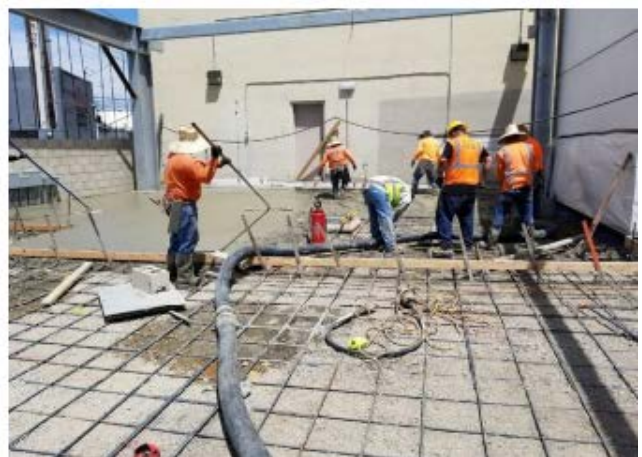

Dear Mr. Jenkins:

As discussed, my office has been representing the County of Los Angeles, Auditor-Controller, and other affected taxing entities including the Los Angeles County West Vector Control District ("District") in a longstanding property tax litigation related to Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund ("ERAF"). This memorandum provides a summary of the proposed settlement for the District. We recommend approval of the settlement amount once finalized.

Background

In 2007, Los Angeles Unified School District ("LAUSD") filed a lawsuit against the County, former redevelopment agencies, and various affected taxing entities regarding the Auditor-Controller's calculation of certain property tax revenues for schools related to ERAF. LAUSD alleged that affected taxing entities, including the special districts, received additional property tax revenues from statutory passthrough payments in the former redevelopment project areas at the expense of the school districts. Three additional school districts, consisting of Montebello Unified School District ("MUSD"), Long Beach Unified School District ("LBUSD"), and Los Angeles Community College District ("LACCD"), subsequently filed similar lawsuits.

After two unfavorable Court of Appeal decisions and multiple years of negotiations, the County reached settlement agreements with the school districts in October and November of 2017 regarding retrospective liability and prospective calculation methodology.

Due to Auditor-Controller's improper passthrough calculation, the District also received additional property tax revenues at the expense of LAUSD and LACCD in the relevant former redevelopment project areas which must be repaid consistent with the court rulings and County settlement.

County Counsel has been negotiating on behalf of the County-controlled special districts (8 total) as well as the District and Wilmington Cemetery District (collectively, the "County-represented special districts").

Analysis

Under the trial court's judgment, the school districts are entitled to 7 percent simple interest on the amounts of passthrough owed. Absent a settlement agreement, the Court can order payment for the liability, including accrued interest. As such, we recommend settlement with LAUSD and LACCD.

District does not owe any money to MUSD or LBUSD.

A. Amounts owed to LAUSD

Under 7 percent simple interest as of September 30, 2017, the total amount due to LAUSD from the County-represented special districts is \$164,196.14, including principal and interests. As part of the settlement negotiation, parties have agreed to waive the special districts that owe relatively minimal amounts - five special districts (each owe less than \$1,500) for a total amount of \$3,878.35. The agreed-upon total amount due for the remaining County-represented special districts is \$158,903.52.

For the District, the total amount due is estimated to be **\$21,496.60**, including principal and interest, to LAUSD.¹

B. Amounts owed to LACCD

Under 7 percent simple interest as of September 30, 2017, the total amount due to LACCD from all the County-represented special districts is \$19,495.45. As part of the settlement negotiation, parties have agreed to waive the special

districts that owe relatively minimal amounts - four special districts (each owe less than \$200) for a total amount of \$381.46. The agreed-upon total amount due from the remaining County-represented special districts is \$18,840.47.

For the District, the total amount due is estimated to be **\$2,400.70**, including principal and interest, to LACCD.

C. Proposed Settlement Agreement

The enclosed form proposed settlement agreement is similar to the County's own settlement agreements with the school districts. I anticipate having two separate agreements for LAUSD and LACCD, respectively.

The District has an option of either directly paying the settlement amount with a warrant or offsetting it with its future 1 percent property tax revenue distribution(s). We recommend agreeing to pay with a warrant. This will ensure that no further interest is accrued if there is insufficient 1 percent property tax revenue distribution.

Each party agreed to bear their own attorneys' fees and litigation costs.


Conclusion

SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT AND MUTUAL RELEASE

This Settlement Agreement and Mutual Release (“Agreement”) is made by and between the Los Angeles Unified School District (“LAUSD”), on the one hand, and the Los Angeles County West Vector Control District (“District”) on the other hand, a party named in the LAUSD Action referenced in Recital A. All of the foregoing parties to this Agreement may hereinafter collectively be referred to as the “Settling Parties” and individually as “Party.”

RECITALS

A. WHEREAS, on or about March 29, 2007, LAUSD filed a lawsuit in the Superior Court of Los Angeles County captioned *LAUSD v. County of Los Angeles et al.*, BS 108180 (“the LAUSD Action”), in which that school district, among other things, (i) alleged it received a legally insufficient share of AB 1290 redevelopment pass-through payments, (ii) alleged that amounts it was entitled to, beginning with the relevant limitations period of FY 2003-04 through and continuing after the petition filing, were instead distributed, improperly, to among others, special district Real Parties in Interests, and (iii) sought a writ of mandate compelling the County of Los Angeles and various former redevelopment agencies to pay the full amount of redevelopment pass-through payments owed to that district under Health and Safety Code sections 33607.5 and 33607.7 (“Pass-through Payments”);

B. WHEREAS, on or about July 7, 2010, the Montebello Unified School District (“MUSD”) filed a lawsuit in the Superior Court of Los Angeles County captioned *MUSD v. County of Los Angeles et al.*, BS 127286; and on or about January 19, 2011, the Los Angeles Community College District (“LACCD”) filed a lawsuit in the Superior Court of Los Angeles County captioned *LACCD v. County of Los Angeles et al.*, BS 130308; and on or about June 4, 2012, Long Beach Unified School District (“LBUSD”) filed a lawsuit in the Superior Court of Los Angeles County captioned *LBUSD v. County of Los Angeles et al.*, BS 137598, and in each case the respective school district raised allegations and sought writ of mandate relief similar to that in the LAUSD Action;

C. WHEREAS, the lawsuits referenced in the preceding paragraphs and respectively brought by LAUSD, MUSD, LACCD, and LBUSD (collectively the “LEA Petitioners”) all posit the same legal theories as those raised in BS 108180 and all four lawsuits were formally related by the Superior Court (“Related Cases” or the “Litigation”);

D. WHEREAS, evidence was received, a trial took place and judgment issued in the LAUSD Action;

E. WHEREAS, the Court of Appeal reversed the trial court’s rulings, and issued two opinions in favor of appellant LAUSD regarding the proper calculation of Pass-through Payments, which decisions are reported at *LAUSD v. County of Los Angeles* (2010) 181 Cal.App.4th 414 and *LAUSD v. County of Los Angeles* (2013) 217 Cal.App.4th 597 (the “Appellate Opinions”);

F. WHEREAS, the Superior Court has from time-to-time in the Related Cases also issued orders and rulings that were not subject of any appeal and are thus now the law of the case in the Related Cases;

G. WHEREAS, the LEA Petitioners and the County, through negotiation and mutual compromises, reached an agreement regarding the proper methods for the calculation of Pass-through Payments to give effect to the rule of law announced in the Appellate Opinions and to the other orders and rulings of the Superior Court in the Related Cases, and this agreement was filed in the Related Cases on August 18, 2014, in the form of two documents entitled “[DRAFT] EXHIBIT A TO SETTLEMENT

AGREEMENT" and "[DRAFT] EXHIBIT B TO SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT" which describe, respectively, the methodologies for the calculation of retrospective and prospective pass-through payments (the "Calculation Methods");

H. WHEREAS, the Trial Court directed all parties in the Related Cases to file any objects to the Calculation Methods by September 30, 2014, and no objections were filed, including the District. t

I. WHEREAS, [DRAFT] EXHIBIT A TO SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT and [DRAFT] EXHIBIT B TO SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT are attached to and incorporated into this Agreement, respectively, as Exhibits A and B, but superseded by the terms of this Agreement, in whole or in part, with respect to the parties to this Agreement, as described below;

J. WHEREAS, the County expressed its preference to use its property tax computer accounting system (the "County System") to calculate Pass-through Payments in conformity with the Calculation Methods;

K. WHEREAS, the LEA Petitioners agreed to consider the use of the County System, provided that the results generated by that system did not diverge substantially from the results that would be obtained if the Calculation Methods were implemented using tax increment calculations outlined either by the California Association of Tax Managers, or by the California Attorney General in Opinion No. 10-101(the "AGO Method");

L. WHEREAS, the County proposed an outline of a global compromise that would permit a comprehensive settlement of the Litigation, pursuant to which the County would modify the operation of the County System to calculate future Pass-through Payments in a manner it believes is consistent with the AGO Method, in exchange for the LEA Petitioners accepting the results generated by the County System's calculations of Pass-through Payments due in the fiscal years and bi-annual distributions under Part 1.85 of Division 24 of the Health and Safety Code (the "Redevelopment Dissolution Law") preceding the date of this Settlement Agreement;

M. WHEREAS, in parallel with the negotiation of the settlement terms governing future Pass-through Payments, the County generated calculations of the retrospective liabilities owed to the LEA Petitioners, and the calculations allocating those liabilities among the Respondents and Real Parties in Interest in the Litigation including District, for review and consideration by the LEA Petitioners;

N. WHEREAS, the LEA Petitioners and County continued to negotiate towards a full settlement of the Litigation to ultimately use a modified County System to calculate the damages for the retrospective liabilities (the "Settlement Damages");

O. WHEREAS, the LEA Petitioners and the County thereafter also cooperated to generate a narrative description of the County's proposed calculation of all Pass-through Payments due in FY 2016-17 and thereafter, primarily in accordance with the terms of the AGO Method, which narrative is attached to and hereby incorporated into this Settlement Agreement as Exhibit C;

P. WHEREAS, subject to future changes in the laws governing Pass-through Payments calculated under Health and Safety Code sections 33607.5 and 33607.7, the Parties agree that Exhibit C shall supersede the terms of Exhibit B when the County calculates pass-through payments in Adjusted Base Tiers, i.e., tiers in which pass-through payments are calculated by reference to an Adjusted Base Year (specifically, Tier 1 payments from so-called ".7 projects" and Tiers 2 and 3 payments from so-called ".5 projects" and ".7 projects") beginning in FY 2016-17;

Q. WHEREAS, the LEA Petitioners and County made monetary concessions, nonmonetary accommodations, and compromises in process and procedure in furtherance of overall settlement of the litigation;

R. WHEREAS, the LEA Petitioners, in order to secure a timely settlement of the Litigation, have compromised their claims to full and complete payment of all damages that they contend are owed to them as a result of the Respondents' and/or Real Parties in Interests' improper calculations and/or payment of Pass-through Payments as set forth in the Judicial Decisions;

S. WHEREAS in furtherance of this settlement of the Litigation, and in recognition of the good faith efforts made in its negotiation, LAUSD and District have agreed to compromise their respective positions regarding the amounts, process, sources, and timing of payment to LAUSD of Settlement Damages, as reflected in the terms of this Settlement Agreement, and have agreed to waive any liability from other County-controlled special districts (i.e., Road District No. 1, Bell Gardens Lighting District, Longden Lighting District, and Firestone Garbage Disposal District) and Wilmington Cemetery District that have minimal amounts (each less than \$1,500) due to LAUSD arising from the Litigation;

T. WHEREAS the County is willing to help effectuate payment by District of the compromised sums allocated under this Settlement Agreement as further set forth herein;

U. WHEREAS, the Parties agree that, as authorized by law, the Los Angeles County Auditor-Controller may make any administrative adjustments necessary to implement this Settlement Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the exchange of the mutual promises and covenants contained in this Settlement Agreement, and for good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, LAUSD and District (the "Settling Parties"), by the signatures of their authorized representatives below, hereby agree as follows:

1. The "Effective Date" means the latest date that (i) this Agreement is executed by LAUSD and ratified by its Board of Education, and (ii) this Agreement is executed by District and if necessary ratified by its governing body.

2. To effectuate the compromises described more fully in the Recitals above and in furtherance of the full resolution of the Litigation, the Settling Parties agree that LAUSD shall be paid \$X (principal and interest) (the "Settlement Damages Amount") by District as described in Paragraph 4. This Settlement Damages Amount to be paid by the District represent a compromise of the LAUSD's damages claims in the Litigation arising from the failure of Respondents and Real Parties in Interest to pay District's share of Pass-through Payments required as set forth in the Judicial Decisions in any fiscal year covered under the relevant statute of limitations to the LAUSD Action, up to and including fiscal year 2015-16.

3. The Settling Parties agree that upon the Effective Date, the terms of this Settlement Agreement regarding Settlement Damages Amount allocated to and payable by District shall supersede in its entirety the terms of the retrospective Calculation Method denominated "[DRAFT] EXHIBIT A TO SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT" with respect to all District's retrospective liabilities.

4. The full and final Settlement Damages Amount shall be paid as follows:

A. District shall pay all of its Settlement Damages Amount by issuing a warrant, check, or draft payable to LAUSD, of the entire Settlement Damages Amount within 30 calendar days of the Effective Date. In the event the entire amount is not paid by the thirtieth (30th) day after it is due, simple interest shall be charged and due directly from District on the late payment from the date due, until paid, at the rate of 7% per annum. In the event that interest is due with respect to a late payment, the amount paid thereon will first be credited to unpaid accrued interest, and thereafter to the principal amount owing;

B. If there is a default by District on any payment due to LAUSD under this Settlement Agreement, LAUSD also shall have the right to enforce payment of all amounts not paid, and any accrued interest, by noticed motion filed in the LAUSD Action, under Code of Civil Procedure section 664.6, notwithstanding any dismissal of the LAUSD Action subsequent to the entry of this Settlement Agreement or a final Judgment is entered in the LAUSD Action or that Action is otherwise settled or concluded.

C. LAUSD shall provide District, through its counsel listed below, with the name and address of the person to whom payment is to be sent if payment is to be made by check or draft, or complete and accurate wire instructions if payment is to be made by wire transfer.

5. District acknowledges that County and LEA Petitioners have agreed upon a Direct Payment Process more fully described in Exhibit D which was submitted to the Court for approval, and said Process would accommodate under certain circumstances a Respondent or Real Party in Interest's payment of retrospective settlement damages over time in installments. District agrees instead to pay its Settlement Damages Amount as described in paragraph 4.

6. The Settling Parties agree and understand that, upon full performance of the obligations set forth in this Settlement Agreement, there will be no need for a writ of mandate or other relief regarding retrospective relief.

7. All amounts paid to LAUSD pursuant to this Settlement Agreement are negotiated settlement damages under Code of Civil Procedure section 1095. In all communications, accounts, legal filings, or reports that address or purport to describe the tax revenues received by local educational agencies, including but not limited to the calculations provided to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction pursuant to Education Code § 41760.2 and any other reports concerning school revenues affecting State apportionments, no settlement damages paid to LAUSD pursuant to any settlement agreement entered in the Litigation, including this Settlement Agreement, shall be characterized or reported as a payment or receipt of current or prior year subventions, property taxes, or other taxes, but shall instead be recognized as settlement damages to the extent the communication, filing, or report in question requires characterization of the settlement damages paid. Notwithstanding the preceding sentence, the District may characterize the source(s) of all or part of the amounts paid by it to LAUSD pursuant to this Settlement Agreement as reserves of tax revenues in any communications, accounts, legal filings, or reports other than those referenced in the preceding sentence.

8. Subject to future changes in the laws governing pass-through payments due under the Health and Safety Code sections 33607.5 and 33607.7, and in order to effectuate the compromises described more fully in the Recitals above and in furtherance of the full resolution of the Litigation, the Settling Parties agree that, commencing with the payment of Pass-through Payments arising from the 2016-17 fiscal year and in all succeeding years, the calculation and distribution of the Pass-through Payments required to be made to all local education agencies in Los Angeles County under Health and

Safety Code sections 33607.5 or 33607.7 shall be done in accordance with the [Proposed] Writ of Mandate Regarding Prospective Relief attached hereto as Exhibit E, and in accordance with the terms of Exhibit B, except insofar as the terms of Exhibit C shall supersede the terms of Exhibit B when the County Auditor-Controller calculates Pass-through Payments in Adjusted Base Tiers, i.e., tiers in which pass-through payments are calculated by reference to an Adjusted Base Year, beginning in FY 2016-17.

9. The Settling Parties consent to the entry of [Proposed] Writ of Mandate Regarding Prospective Relief attached hereto as Exhibit E to the Court in order to effectuate this Settlement Agreement.

10. LAUSD and District will each bear its own legal fees and costs in connection with the LAUSD Action.

11. Except for any obligations created by, or breaches of, this Settlement Agreement, LAUSD, for itself, its Board of Education, officers, directors, Board members (past and present), managers, administrators, agents, employees, representatives, attorneys, divisions, departments, beneficiaries, predecessors, successors and assigns, hereby releases and forever discharges District, its past, present, and future governing boards, board members, directors, and each of its affiliates and other related entities, and its respective predecessors, successors and assigns, and its respective past and present officers, directors, attorneys, agents, employees, representatives, insurers and reinsurers from any and all claims, demands, causes of action, liabilities, damages, obligations, duties, responsibilities, costs, attorneys' fees and expenses of any nature or amount, whether known or unknown, suspected or unsuspected, including claims for breach of contract, breach of the implied covenant of good faith and fair dealing, statutory or regulatory violations, or punitive, exemplary or extra-contractual damages of any type, arising out of, based upon, or relating in any way to the LAUSD Action.

12. Except for any obligations created by, or any breaches of, this Settlement Agreement, District, for itself, its officers, directors, agents, employees, parent companies, subsidiaries, affiliates and other related entities, representatives, attorneys, predecessors, successors and assigns, do hereby release, acquit and forever discharge LAUSD, its past, present, and future Board of Education, officers, directors, Board members, managers, administrators, agents, employees, representatives, attorneys, divisions, departments, beneficiaries, predecessors, successors and assigns from any and all claims, demands, causes of action, liabilities, damages, obligations, duties, responsibilities, costs, attorneys' fees and expenses of any nature or amount, whether known or unknown, suspected or unsuspected, including claims for breach of contract, breach of the implied covenant of good faith and fair dealing, statutory or regulatory violations, or punitive, exemplary or extra-contractual damages of any type, arising out of, based upon, or relating in any way to the LAUSD Action.

13. With respect to the LAUSD Action, each Settling Party expressly waives any and all rights and benefits under California Civil Code § 1542, which states:

A GENERAL RELEASE DOES NOT EXTEND TO CLAIMS WHICH THE CREDITOR DOES NOT KNOW OR SUSPECT TO EXIST IN HIS OR HER FAVOR AT THE TIME OF EXECUTING THE RELEASE, WHICH IF KNOWN BY HIM OR HER MUST HAVE MATERIALLY AFFECTED HIS OR HER SETTLEMENT WITH THE DEBTOR.

Each of the Settling Parties acknowledges that it is represented by counsel and has been specifically advised by counsel of the consequences of this waiver. Each of the Settling Parties further acknowledges that it may hereafter discover facts in addition to or different from those which it now knows or believes to be true with respect to the subject matter of this Settlement Agreement, but it is its

intention to now fully and finally settle all disputes, known or unknown, in accordance with and subject to this Settlement Agreement, notwithstanding the discovery or existence of any such additional or different facts.

14. Each Settling Party hereto acknowledges, notwithstanding any other term of this Settlement Agreement, that: despite the effectiveness of this Settlement Agreement as described in paragraph 1, through no fault of the Settling Parties, other parties to the Related Cases, or other unrelated entities, could obtain through their actions in this Litigation, or through separate litigation, a form of relief or remedy as to their rights or liabilities, which could result in a claim, liability, duty or cost to be imposed against one or more of these Settling Parties that was not set forth in this Settlement Agreement; such a result would not be a breach of nor invalidate this Settlement Agreement or any part thereof.

15. Each of the Settling Parties represents and warrants that as of the Effective Date, it has not assigned, conveyed or otherwise transferred, or purported to assign, convey or transfer, any of the claims, demands, causes of action, rights, or obligations released pursuant to this Settlement Agreement.

16. The Settling Parties intend this Settlement Agreement to be a permanent and binding accord and resolution of their rights and obligations with respect to the LAUSD Action, which arise from the deficiencies in making Pass-through Payments in any fiscal year covered under the relevant statute of limitations to the LAUSD Action. This Settlement Agreement will be enforceable at law and admissible as evidence in any future arbitration, judicial or administrative proceedings for purposes of enforcing this Settlement Agreement. The Settling Parties intend that this Settlement Agreement may be enforced through and under the authority of the Superior Court in the pending LAUSD Action, and after a final Judgment is entered in the LAUSD Action, or that action is otherwise settled or concluded, pursuant to California Code of Civil Procedure § 664.6. To effect this right of enforcement, the Settling Parties shall execute and file in the LAUSD Action a Stipulation to Retain Jurisdiction before final Judgment is entered or before the Court approves a final settlement of all claims lodged in that Action.

17. By entering into this Settlement Agreement, the Settling Parties do not intend to make, nor shall they be deemed to have made, any admission of any kind, including but not limited to any admission as to the merits or validity of any claims or defenses or legal arguments in the LAUSD Action. The Settling Parties are entering into this Settlement Agreement solely as a business decision for the purposes of settling certain disputed claims and to avoid the cost and uncertainty of litigation with respect to these disputes. This Settlement Agreement is the product of informed negotiations and compromises of previously stated legal and factual positions conducted under among other things California Evidence Code § 1152.

18. This Settlement Agreement shall be construed and enforced in accordance with, and shall be governed by, the laws of the State of California.

19. This Settlement Agreement may be executed in two or more counterparts, each of which shall be considered an original, but all of which shall constitute one instrument. The Settling Parties agree to enter into any other agreements or execute any other documents necessary to effectuate any provision of this Settlement Agreement.

20. This Settlement Agreement constitutes the Settling Parties' entire agreement and supersedes and replaces all prior written and oral agreements regarding the subject matter of this Settlement Agreement. This Settlement Agreement may not be modified except by a writing executed by the duly authorized representatives of all of the Settling Parties. Each Settling Party acknowledges that no other party or agent or attorney of any other party has made any promise, representation or warranty, express or implied, which is not expressly contained in this Settlement Agreement.

21. This Settlement Agreement reflects the joint drafting efforts of all Settling Parties. If any dispute, disagreement or controversy arises regarding this Settlement Agreement, the Settling Parties shall be considered joint authors, and no provision shall be interpreted against any Settling Party because of authorship. Each Settling Party has been fully informed as to the meaning and intent of this Settlement Agreement and has been advised by independent counsel of its choosing in that regard.

22. 


